

# REVIEW OF THE YEAR

The Ford Foundation's general purpose is to advance human welfare. More specifically, it serves the public welfare by trying to identify problems of importance to the nation and the world and by supplying funds on a limited scale for efforts directed at their solution. Its activities are mostly in the United States and mostly related to education.

The Foundation is faced with many hard choices in selecting the uses to which its resources may best be put. But it does not devise answers or impose solutions. Its grants, in effect, do no more than underwrite the time and talent of individuals and institutions capable of organizing and pioneering the search for answers to the problems that confront society. It attempts to confine itself to actions and amounts designed to demonstrate the dimensions of these problems and, hopefully, to stimulate a public response.

No foundation or combination of foundations can solve the many complex problems that civilization poses, or meet the many plaguing needs that arise from the continuously evolving business of living and learning. The most a foundation can do is to make a start, or indicate a route, or call attention to an idea. If the direction is right and the method sound, if a solution seems possible, then the people themselves—individually or collectively through their voluntary agencies or governments—will finish the job.

What the foundation can do—what it is uniquely able to do in our society—can be summed up in four characteristics that are both advantages and responsibilities.

First, it can be discriminating. It can select a problem that seems important; it can single out an individual, an institution, or a program for support; it can choose on the basis of criteria involving no pressures but those of common sense; it can consider conflicting ideas without partisanship or passion.

Second, it can pioneer. It can do things when and where they need to be done and not be bound by popular vote; it can enter controversial areas and explore them; it can take a chance in fields where government, because of political considerations, or industry, because of economic considerations, or education, because of lack of funds, may be reluctant to venture.

Third, it can show by example. It can call attention to urgent problems or needs and, by so doing, encourage interest and effort by others, and thus stimulate the development of ideas and people for the nation as a whole.

Fourth, it can be flexible. It can enter fields rapidly, and just as rapidly leave them, to prove or disprove new concepts and thus encourage others in provable or possible directions.

# **Higher Education and American Society**

In its effort to serve our democratic society and, by extension, to advance human welfare, the Ford Foundation has found America's institutions of higher learning to be its close and responsive associates. Whatever the problem with which it is concerned, Foundation action generally is directed at helping the resources of education to lead and sustain the attack. Ultimately, therefore, most Foundation grants are made to strengthen the nation's centers of teaching and research.

For a century or more, the educational institutions of the United States have provided not only the education needed by citizens in a democratic nation but have undertaken many other functions in the public service. In recent years, our institutions of higher education have assumed even greater responsibilities for many aspects of our national welfare and national security. From the colleges and universities of the country flow the ideas and the people that influence the direction of science, industry, politics, national defense, the arts and humanities, indeed every sphere of our national life.

If these wellsprings of knowledge and learning are neglected, the very core of American enterprise as we know it is threatened. To the extent that they are deprived of the resources necessary to develop fully their potential, to that extent the nation fails to attain its own highest level of progress.

The Ford Foundation has followed the example of American education itself—and of the nation as a whole—in conceiving of its interests and responsibilities in world-wide rather than merely domestic terms. Education, like the sciences and the arts, has never been confined within national boundaries. American educators have found opportunities for service abroad, and they have sought in their teaching and research to understand the world as it has been changed by the political upheavals and the scientific revolution of the mid-twentieth century.

But higher education is beset today by financial difficulties greater than those of any other period in American history. They are the result of a set of circumstances imposed upon higher education by the society it serves, and hence they become the responsibility of that society.

The larger number seeking education, the demand for more years of

education, the expanding fund of knowledge (especially in science and technology), and our nation's role as leader of the free world—these have brought new problems and new challenges that are awesome in scope but at the same time challenging in the magnificent opportunities they provide for service on a scale never before possible.

The Ford Foundation, within the limitations of its resources, has been trying to do something about these problems. The cornerstone of the Foundation's philosophy and program is the belief that through education society can realize its fullest potential for material abundance, intellectual enlightenment, and moral growth. Through education, man learns the secrets of nature so that it will serve him; he learns about the past so that he may be wisely guided in the present and the future; and he learns the moral values that he can apply in his relationships with his fellow-men.

# **Evolution of Program**

The Ford Foundation is essentially an educational foundation. At the heart of its program is an abiding interest in the educated individual. We are concerned with the excellence of the institutional structure, with helping to redress imbalances between areas of undue concentration and undue neglect, and with the search for new knowledge. But we are primarily interested in the product that only good education can provide: the thinking man.

Whether its members be educated or uneducated and ultimately wise or foolish, society must wrestle with the problems of human existence and apply whatever resources it can command to choosing a sane course in a precarious world. Education offers no guarantees, but our choices as a nation will be closer to reality if the quality of our thinking is more creative and the number of people capable of constructive thought is larger.

In these terms, education extends beyond the academic world and into the atmosphere of society, which is the composite of the beliefs and ambitions of its members. This is where foundations have an appropriate role to play, not in shaping those beliefs and ambitions but in encouraging competent, serious-minded people to understand, maintain, and realize them.

During the year, the evolution of the Foundation's program continued. The Foundation, which was created in 1936 by Henry and Edsel Ford, has been in existence for twenty-one years, but its current range of activity reflects the accelerated development and expansion of the last seven. In 1949, the Foundation made grants of approximately \$3.2 million; but in all other years prior to 1950 the totals were less, and in most years the

totals did not exceed \$1.5 million. Grants were made mainly in Detroit and the State of Michigan.

When it became apparent in 1948 that bequests from the estates of the founders would greatly increase the Foundation's assets—and thereby its scope and capacity as a philanthropy—considerable study was given to the areas of activity in which it might concentrate. By decision of the trustees, the Foundation in 1951 undertook a program of assistance in five fields. These were broadly defined as: the establishment of peace; the strengthening of democracy; the strengthening of the economy; education in a democratic society; and individual behavior and human relations.

As its programs developed in practice, the Foundation's concern for the establishment of peace took the form of aid both to American and foreign institutions.

The Overseas Development program incorporated educational, economic, and social assistance to various nations of South and Southeast Asia and the Near East.

A complementary purpose—that of increasing the number of Americans competent to understand foreign areas least known to the Western world and to deal with the general problems of international relations—was embodied in the International Training and Research program.

The International Affairs program was established to carry on the Foundation's program in Europe and to work with nonacademic institutions that seek to increase our understanding of international relations.

Finally, a program in International Legal Studies was undertaken.

All of these programs have helped to foster the exchange of ideas and of scholars between the United States and other countries.

The strengthening of democracy became a program of Public Affairs with primary emphasis on legal and governmental institutions and public leadership in the United States.

The strengthening of the economy has supported educational institutions concerned with Economic Development and Administration.

Education in a democratic society, the Foundation's major concern over the years, has concentrated on strengthening the formal system of education in the nation.

Individual behavior and human relations were translated into a program of research and training in the Behavioral Sciences.

In addition to activities encouraged or conducted by the Foundation itself, a number of independent organizations was established, which undertook, under their own trustees and officers, to work on problems related to the five basic fields. These were: the Fund for the Advancement

of Education, the Fund for Adult Education, the Fund for the Republic, Resources for the Future, Inc., the National Merit Scholarship Corporation, the Center for Advanced Study in the Behavioral Sciences, and the Council on Library Resources, Inc.

Two others were the East European Fund, which has completed its program and is preparing to liquidate, and Intercultural Publications, Inc., which no longer receives support from the Foundation but is carrying on its program independently.

# **Current Activities**

At first, most grants in each Foundation program were specific, pinpointed actions to assist a single institution or a single effort. In time, however, it became apparent that effective attacks on various problems in the various areas required several approaches and grants over extended periods of time. These grant clusters eventually acquired a size and emphasis that warranted recognition of them as programs in their own right. As a result, the Foundation's total activity today, although it traces back to the original five areas, actually ranges over some twenty programs.

In the past fiscal year, this structure was formally acknowledged, and a program planning budget was adopted that allocates funds by programs rather than by areas. Under this arrangement, ongoing programs are allotted about one-half of the Foundation's anticipated annual income of \$100 million. The other \$50 million is reserved for special problems of national importance, usually related to one of the program areas, to which the Foundation feels it can devote sizable sums for major, immediate impacts.

The principal advantages of this method of budgeting are more precise determination of a program's financial requirements and greater over-all flexibility. By avoiding built-in commitments to one type of activity or another and by resisting the impetus of prior-year precedents, the Foundation can respond more readily to new needs of society as they arise.

Generally speaking, we do not believe the Foundation should be the sole source of support for a particular activity. Nor do we think that efforts once undertaken should necessarily continue indefinitely. Our current activities should be viewed as a program-in-process, as something that changes with the passage of time, as something dynamic and responsive, not static and circumscribed.

At any one time, certain programs will be ascendant, with an increasing investment of time and dollars behind them. Others will have reached a peak and leveled off, with stable budget allowances for an indeterminate

period. And a few in any year will have come to a conclusion, either because they have made their point or satisfied their premise as far as the Foundation is concerned, or because support sufficient to continue them has been stimulated in other sources. As a general rule, there will also be one or more large-scale grants for special programs.

In the past fiscal year, seven programs were of ascending importance: The Foundation's interests in Europe, for which grants have been made since 1951, were crystallized into a European program.

The range of the program in Economic Development and Administration was increased.

Several grants toward the end of the year marked the beginning of the Arts part of a new program in Humanities and the Arts.

The program in Urban and Regional Development continued to support research and education in the large and complex problems of America's cities and urban regions.

A program in Youth Development, now in formulation, is emerging from the Public Affairs area.

Problems of the Aging, representing a concern with the social and economic condition of the nation's older citizens, is growing out of Economic Development and Administration.

In addition, the Foundation has also made a start on a new program in Science and Engineering. This is the first new program undertaken by the Foundation that has not derived directly from the original areas of concentration. It is, of course, related to, and the Foundation's interest will largely center around, the general field of education. The dimensions of the Foundation program in Science and Engineering are under study now, and increasing activity can be expected in the coming year.

The Foundation's program in Education was reorganized during the year with the re-entry of the Fund for the Advancement of Education into the Foundation itself. The Fund was established in 1951 and has pursued a five-point program for the improvement of education in the United States. Its objectives are to clarify the aims, functions, and relationships of schools, colleges, and universities; to improve teaching; to improve curriculum; to improve the management and financing of education; and to reduce inequalities of educational opportunity.

Gradual merger of the Foundation and the Fund will permit a combination of resources and, hopefully, a more fruitful, broad-scale attack on the problems of education than either organization could undertake separately. The combined program will use both experimentation and proved ideas and will work primarily through established institutions. The Fund

will continue its independent existence until the unexpended portion of funds made available earlier by the Foundation is granted. Meanwhile, Clarence H. Faust, president of the Fund, has joined the Foundation as a vice president, and initial grants under the combined program were made during the past year.

# **Completed Programs**

The Behavioral Sciences program and the TV-Radio Workshop were concluded during the 1957 fiscal year.

The Behavioral Sciences program, which began in 1951, accounted for approximately \$38.5 million in grants during its existence. More than half of this amount went for general development of the field in colleges and universities, and for the establishment and maintenance of the Center for Advanced Study in the Behavioral Sciences. The remainder was appropriated for research and research training in mental health.

The program has had a wide influence on the field and on related disciplines. Many of its grants extend into the future. Many aspects of the study of human behavior will continue to receive consideration in other Foundation programs. Terminal grants of \$9,838,900, all of which provide long-term support for certain activities, were made late in the year.

The TV-Radio Workshop produced the ninety-minute television program *Omnibus* for five years as an experiment intended to demonstrate that a cultural program could be both adult and entertaining and could compete for audience loyalty and commercial sponsorship. Reception by audiences, critics, and sponsors proved the validity of the program's concept, and it attained the stature and strength to continue as an independent venture. Title to the program and its library of films and kinescopes were sold to a new corporation headed by Robert Saudek, director of the Workshop.

Three other programs were concluded with the completion of payments from the special appropriations of \$550 million voted in 1955. These were the \$260 million for college-faculty salaries, \$200 million for the extension of services in private, voluntary hospitals, and \$90 million for the improvement of instruction in forty-five privately controlled medical schools.

The Ford Foundation in the 1957 fiscal year, which ended September 30, undertook new commitments totaling \$83,029,117. These included \$46,044,717 in new grants, and \$36,984,400 in new appropriations that will be converted gradually into grants and projects associated with grants.

A total of \$345,200,897 was paid out on grants made within the year or carried over from prior years.

One trustee of the Foundation, Robert B. Anderson, resigned upon becoming Secretary of the Treasury. He was a judicious contributor to the deliberations of the trustees, and his resignation was accepted with regret. I am sure he will discharge his new responsibility in the federal government with wisdom and honor.

Roy E. Larsen, president of Time, Inc., was elected as a trustee on September 27, 1957.

Three administrative changes of note occurred during the year: Richard W. Lambourne, Treasurer, was designated chief financial officer, responsible for investment and accounting functions, and Joseph M. McDaniel, Jr., Secretary, was placed in charge of administrative and internal management functions of the Foundation. Quigg Newton, Jr., Vice President, resigned to become president of the University of Colorado.

# **Contributions and Goals**

The evolutionary nature of the Foundation's program and the inevitable time lag between grant actions and results make it exceedingly difficult to evaluate a year's activity in any certain terms. At the end of a fiscal year, we can only hope, in good conscience, that the hard choices we made were good ones and that the long-term results will be positive.

It is possible to report precisely and definitely only plans, purposes, and actions. In the larger terms of programs addressed to broad social, economic, and educational problems, the ultimate effects may be distant, subtle, and different at different points in time. The true goal, the invaluable achievement that dollars can encourage but can never buy, is one I referred to earlier: the thinking man.

If the Ford Foundation can contribute in reasonable measure to this end, if it can help identify and develop good people and good ideas, if it can help broaden the outlook and extend the capabilities of the nation's greatest resource—its human resources—it will have served the public welfare in the best possible way and justified the trust that society has placed in it. This we shall try always to do.

# EDUCATION IN THE UNITED STATES

The condition of the teacher in America today and the oncoming crisis in providing sufficient school and college facilities to accommodate mounting

student enrollments were the principal problems for which grants were made under the Foundation's program in Education in 1957.

Many activities supported by the Fund for the Advancement of Education are not included in this report, but are dealt with in the Fund's regular reports and publications.

# **Woodrow Wilson National Fellowship Foundation**

The largest single action of the year was a grant of \$24.5 million for development and expansion of the Woodrow Wilson National Fellowship Foundation to establish on a nationwide basis its program for attracting able college students into teaching careers. The program will award 1,000 graduate fellowships a year for the next five years as a means of combating the already serious teacher shortage and of offsetting the stiff competition of industry, government, and other occupations for outstanding students.

The program envisions, first, a continuing recruitment campaign, utilizing a corps of a hundred or more faculty members, who will give approximately a third of their time to stimulating faculty cooperation in identifying potential teachers on 1,000 or more college campuses.

Nominations for fellowships will be made by local faculty members and final selections by regional committees and a national committee of college and university teachers. The first 1,000 fellowships will be awarded in June, 1958. Names of nominees who do not receive fellowships will be available to graduate schools as a source of quality candidates.

Each student designated as a Woodrow Wilson fellow will receive an average of \$2,200 toward tuition and living expenses for a first year of graduate study in the field and, in general, at the institution of his choice. Approximately \$11 million of the total grant will be allocated to fellowships.

In addition, colleges and universities will receive grants of \$2,000 for each fellow who enrolls. Three-quarters of this amount must be used to aid graduate students—but not necessarily Woodrow Wilson fellows—particularly in the final year of study. The remainder may be used for additional fellowships or for general strengthening of the institution's graduate program. These grants will consume \$10 million of the total.

The recruiting program is expected to cost \$2.5 million and administrative expenses over the five years \$1 million. A separate grant of \$200,000 was made to the Association of American Universities and its affiliate, the Association of Graduate Schools, to increase the 1957 Woodrow Wilson fellowships from 200 to 300.

The Fellowship Foundation, which has its headquarters at Ann Arbor, Michigan, will operate independently of the Ford Foundation under a governing board of distinguished educators and laymen. Chairman is Cleo F. Craig, former Chairman of the Board of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company. Other directors are: Alexander H. Brawner, Chairman of the Board, W. P. Fuller & Co.; Cass Canfield, Chairman of the Editorial Committee, Harper & Bros.; Philip G. Davidson, President, University of Louisville; David Graham, Financial Vice President, Standard Oil Co. of Indiana; Lewis M. Hammond, Dean of the Graduate School, University of Virginia; Theodore M. Hesburgh, C.S.C., President, University of Notre Dame; Clark Kerr, Chancellor, University of California; Douglas M. Knight, President, Lawrence College; Whitney J. Oates, Professor of Classics and Chairman of the Department of Classics, Princeton University; Nathan M. Pusey, President, Harvard University; Whitney North Seymour, partner, Simpson, Thatcher & Bartlett; Howard C. Sheperd, Chairman of the Board and chief executive officer, First National City Bank of New York; and Earl P. Stevenson, Chairman of the Board, Arthur D. Little, Inc.

National Director of the Woodrow Wilson National Fellowship program is Richard C. Boys.

The Woodrow Wilson fellowships were begun in 1945 by Princeton University and were organized nationally in 1952 with sponsorship by the Association of American Universities. Prior to the Ford Foundation's action, the program had been supported by grants of more than \$1 million from the Carnegie Corporation and the General Education Board.

### **Educational Facilities Laboratories**

The second major action under the Education program in 1957 was an appropriation of \$4.5 million to establish and support for five years the Educational Facilities Laboratories.

The Laboratories are an independent research organization concerned with more efficient construction and use of school and college facilities. They are designed to contribute to the solution of the school-building crisis, which, even today, confronts the nation with student enrollments 2.3 million in excess of normal capacity, and which, over the next decade, will require an estimated \$40 billion or more for new construction and equipment.

The purposes of the Laboratories are: to collect and disseminate information on efficient school and college facilities, and on the effectiveness of

various aspects of school buildings and equipment in relation to educational programs; to promote and sponsor research in school-building design, construction, equipment, and facilities; and to locate experimental building projects and programs that might cooperate in laboratory efforts to develop new knowledge about future educational requirements.

Aside from research projects, which it may stimulate or support in cooperation with school systems, colleges, and universities or teacher-training institutions, the Laboratories will undertake to coordinate the efforts of such interested and related fields as education, industry, architecture, and design. They will not, however, test or approve materials.

The funds will be used for grants to educational institutions, for publications, and for central-office operation. The Laboratories will be directed by a board drawn from education, business, communications, the professions, and labor. An advisory council will also be formed with members selected from appropriate organizations.

### **Educational Television**

The Educational Television and Radio Center, at Ann Arbor, Michigan, was given \$113,550 for informational and developmental activities during 1957-58. The Center, which was established in 1952 by the Fund for Adult Education and is now supported by the Foundation, is a clearinghouse for educational-television program material. It collects and distributes completed films, exchanges kinescoped programs among educational stations, and contracts for the production of new programs.

The new grant will permit further informational activities on educational television throughout the country, and specific services to communities and citizen groups interested in the development of the medium.

The National Association of Educational Broadcasters received a grant of \$97,000 to continue its program of professional guidance to educational stations in engineering, management, and personnel placement.

The American Council on Education, an association of educational organizations, was granted \$125,000 to continue for one year the legal and technical services of the Joint Council on Educational Television in protecting and activating educational channels not yet in use.

Boston University and the Universities of North Carolina and Wisconsin each received a grant of \$37,500 to enable members of their faculties to be released from teaching duties to participate in educational-television programs.

# **Physics Instruction**

The improvement of secondary-school instruction in physics was supported by a grant of \$500,000 to the Massachusetts Institute of Technology to complete development of a new physics course by its Physical Science Study Committee.

The Committee, consisting of physicists, high-school teachers, and other educators, is seeking to overcome both the shortage of physics teachers and a decline in enrollments in physics courses through a revision of teaching materials and methods. A new physics textbook and a manual for teachers are in preparation. Production of films and film strips, and development of classroom demonstrations, laboratory work, and apparatus a student can assemble and operate by himself are contemplated.

The project has been receiving support from the National Science Foundation. The Ford Foundation's grant will underwrite approximately one-third the cost of completing the course.

# **HUMANITIES AND THE ARTS**

Development of a Foundation program in the creative arts was begun in 1957 and combined with activities in the humanities that have been under way since 1955. In its first phase, the new combined program will have four objectives that it will support in all fields of the arts and letters and in every type of cultural institution, whether related or not to the formal education structure. These are: creative development of individual talents; stimulation of experiments, demonstrations, and studies helping to clarify objectives, set standards, or open new avenues in the arts and humanities; preparation of a comprehensive study of the economic and social positions of the arts and of the artist in America today; and encouragement of scholarship and scholarly projects basic to the humanities generally rather than to specialized fields.

In implementing these objectives, the Foundation expects to call frequently upon consultants and specialists throughout the country for advice. Responsible persons in the field also will play a major role in nominating and selecting talented persons for support at critical stages in the development of their artistic careers. Through a variety of arrangements designed to assist such persons, the Foundation hopes to stimulate creative production generally, although no general program of fellowships is contemplated.

The experiments and studies that can be supported under the current

program are few in number and will not include grants for general operating support, either to cultural institutions in the arts or to humanities programs in colleges and universities.

Projects chosen are expected either to have a pervasive effect throughout the art concerned or to furnish factual data about the arts field. Five grants made at the close of the fiscal year are examples of the kinds of projects being considered. These were:

- a five-year experiment to determine the proper curriculum for the independent art school, to be undertaken by the Minneapolis School of Art (\$150,000);
- a three-year experiment by the Experimental Opera Theatre of America, of the New Orleans Opera House Association, in providing debuts for young American singers (\$165,000);
- a three-year experiment by the American Music Center and six American symphony orchestras in multiple regional performances of new symphonic works (\$210,000);
- an experiment by the Cleveland Play House Foundation in the development of talented actors and in extending professional theater to small towns of the Middle West (\$130,000);
- a demonstration by the City Center of Music and Drama's New York City Opera Company of a modern American operatic repertoire during 1958 (\$105,000).

The comprehensive survey of the arts is expected to fill many of the gaps in factual information about the arts in the United States. It will serve, among other purposes, as a guide to the arts as a field for philanthropic investment. The survey will be conducted over the next two years, and cultural leaders in every field and from all sections of the country will serve as advisers and consultants in its preparation.

# Lincoln Center for the Performing Arts

One exception to the general policies outlined above for Foundation support of the arts is a conditional grant of \$2.5 million—made before the formal establishment of the Arts program—for New York's projected Lincoln Center for the Performing Arts.

This new Center, being planned by a distinguished committee headed by John D. Rockefeller III, will bring together in a new working relationship, with a modern physical setting, several of New York's most significant institutions in the arts, including the Metropolitan Opera Association, the New York Philharmonic Symphony Society, and the Juilliard School of Music.

The national and international significance of this development is, in the opinion of the Foundation's trustees, sufficient to merit its encouragement.

# **Program in the Humanities**

Prior to establishment of the new combined program, grants in the humanities had been made to provide research time for humanistic scholars and to assist in the publication of completed works.

The Foundation granted \$2,637,000 to support the new and expanded program of the American Council of Learned Societies through 1962. The objective of the Foundation's grant to the A.C.L.S. was to recognize the importance of the organization in lending responsible support to humanistic scholarship for its own sake, and to the humanities as basic to education.

Book publication in the humanities and the social sciences is being assisted by a Foundation appropriation of \$1,725,000, from which grants have been made to thirty university presses.

One grant—support for the revision of the Short-Title Catalogue of English Books—was made in the area of the program that specifically concerns humanistic scholarship. A limited number of other such projects will be considered, but like the one already approved, they must be basic to broad scholarly interests in the humanities, including scholarship in the creative arts, and not merely to some special field.

# **PUBLIC AFFAIRS**

In its Public Affairs program, the Foundation hopes to contribute to the processes of democratic self-government by helping to bring better men to government, by helping to relate the resources of academic institutions and government, and by helping to develop citizenship understanding and support essential for a strong democracy. It tries to identify important problems, stimulate public interest, and support research, experimentation, and demonstration.

# Citizenship Understanding and Participation

Democracy's success in a changing world depends primarily upon the extent of citizenship understanding and participation in public affairs. Our citizens

must be both wise and public-spirited, and they must be willing to devote time and energy to the public welfare, if our system of government is to survive, much less improve.

This year the Foundation made grants of \$150,000 to the American Heritage Foundation to encourage registration and voting and, through a fact-finding program, to lay a basis for modernizing voting laws; \$40,000 to the National Civil Service League to promote understanding of and participation in career public service; \$100,000 to Princeton University to help finance the publication of the Thomas Jefferson papers; and \$125,000 to the National Archives Trust Fund Board to help finance a documentary history of the ratification of the Constitution and the first ten amendments.

# **Leadership in Public Affairs**

Leadership, both in quantity and quality, is essential to continuing progress in American democracy. But leadership is highly varied in nature, both general and specialized, operating at many different levels, and often fading subtly into discriminating followership. Several grants were made this year to help understand leadership and to help improve, conserve, and develop it.

These included two grants to the University of Chicago—one of \$175,000 to enable it to expand its present program of courses for federal-government employees to include state-, county-, and city-government personnel and professional employees of civic organizations engaged in quasi-public activities; the other of \$25,000 for a national summer institute in executive development for federal administrators.

New York University received \$250,000 for a five-year program of executive development, to be conducted in cooperation with the City of New York, for city employees in the New York metropolitan area.

# The Legislative Process

Representative government is the base of democracy in the Western world, and legislative bodies are indispensable parts of representative government. Government performance cannot rise much above the level that legislative bodies achieve in rational, responsible, and representative action. Thus, legislative performance is a proper public concern, and legislative problems and processes need to be understood and appreciated.

Our role is to assist where we can to clarify legislative problems and processes, encourage constructive thinking, and help legislators meet their

difficult problems more effectively—and to do this without espousing particular reforms.

One of the problems with which state legislators are confronted is the operational effectiveness of their state constitutions. There is substantial agreement that many should be modernized. Before they can be amended or revised, however, there is need for compilation of widely scattered basic materials, followed by analysis and publication.

To further this work, the Foundation made three grants: \$160,000 to Columbia University for a two-year program of research and publication of basic state legal and constitutional materials; \$150,000 to the National Municipal League to prepare pamphlets and manuals on problems and issues of constitutional change and on the organization and machinery of state constitutional conventions; and \$15,000 to Rutgers University for a study of selected state constitutional problems.

The University of California (Berkeley) received \$200,000 for support of an inter-university program of legislative internships. The program's purpose is to extend the training of promising young persons whose careers are in public affairs. Similarly, the American Political Science Association was granted \$211,250 for partial support of a program in which young political-science or journalism graduates work for a year in the offices of members of Congress.

Two grants—one of \$24,397 to the Washington State Research Council, Inc., and another of \$23,000 to West Virginia University—enabled legislators of the two states to hold pre-legislative conferences at which problems of their respective states could be discussed without the time pressures of a legislative calendar.

# Law and Society

Law is a basic element of our society. Legal education is one of the traditional preparations for public service, and lawyers today hold more legislative and other governmental offices than any other professional group. But the orientation of legal education is private rather than public, and the Foundation has been interested in enriching legal education as a preparation for public service.

A grant of \$7,500 will enable the Association of American Law Schools to publish a summary of a 1956 conference on the problems of educating lawyers for public responsibility. The Association also received \$10,300 to study available resources for legal education and their administration by universities and law schools in the United States.

# Advancing the Science and Art of Government

The study of government on an intensive basis is a relative late-comer to the ranks of organized knowledge. Much remains to be done in furthering the understanding of democratic government and how it actually works in practice so that it can cope with problems of the times. The Foundation supports basic research and creative scholarship in public affairs and aids efforts to bring the results to the improvement of government.

The Foundation has provided funds for research professorships in governmental affairs at six universities. To reach other colleges and universities where there is not sufficient faculty to warrant a professorship, a grant of \$540,000 was made to the Social Science Research Council, which will make grants to individual scholars for independent studies.

Syracuse University was granted \$325,000 for an inter-university research program on histories of administrative decisions, and the University of Minnesota received \$18,190 for a survey of the study of politics.

# URBAN AND REGIONAL PROBLEMS

By 1975, fifty to sixty million people will be added to those already crowded into some 200 metropolitan areas in the United States. Each of these areas sprawls over scores, and often hundreds, of local-government boundary lines and, increasingly, over state lines. This sprawl will continue; in twenty years linear cities may form unbroken urban areas from Boston to Norfolk, Los Angeles to San Francisco, and along the Great Lakes from Milwaukee and Chicago to Pittsburgh.

Two years ago, in recognition of the pressing problems of urban areas and the regions around them, the Foundation began a new program. By the end of this year, twenty grants and appropriations totaling \$3,761,180 had been made. In 1957, demonstration projects totaling \$2,058,500 were financed in nine metropolitan areas—New York, Boston, Cleveland, St. Louis, Kansas City (Missouri), Peoria, Dayton, Philadelphia, and the Piedmont area in North Carolina. Generally, these projects have the following objectives:

To provide a vehicle for considering problems and formulating plans that will affect the whole area and thus overcome governmental fragmentation; to identify and improve local leadership; to encourage research on metropolitan problems and decision-making through a partnership of scholars and community representatives; and to attract and train able people from all walks of life, especially universities, to work on urban problems.

There is a critical shortage of urban planners, and there is a vital need to emphasize the role of research in training planners. A grant of \$410,000 was made to the University of Pennsylvania for a research professorship in urban affairs, for developing teaching methods and materials, and for bringing practitioners in urban affairs to the university.

In the study of an urban or regional area, there is need for interuniversity cooperation so that better use can be made of the knowledge and skills of various scholars. This is being done in several of the studies supported by the Foundation. A grant of \$25,000 to the University of Southern California will enable faculty members of several California colleges and universities to make a planning study of urban problems in the state.

A grant of \$131,000 to Delaware River Basin Research, Inc., will finance research on the governmental aspects of developing water resources in the New York-New Jersey-Pennsylvania-Delaware urban area. The research program will seek to develop methods of federal-state-local joint action in solving urban problems.

# ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT AND ADMINISTRATION

### **Education for Business**

Programs in business education, which now attract approximately one out of eight college students, face a forced growth to accommodate an ever-increasing enrollment. Fortunately, business education is undergoing a vigorous re-examination. In line with the need and the promise, the Foundation has supported fresh, experimental approaches at a number of institutions.

A few undergraduate schools of business are moving away from excessive specialization in traditional business functions and toward an integrated curriculum emphasizing relevant training in the social sciences and humanities. The Foundation made a \$250,000 grant to the Northwestern University School of Business to help rebuild its undergraduate program along these lines.

Liberal-arts colleges are increasingly dissatisfied with the business courses they offer. Often these are limited in perspective and represent neither satisfactory undergraduate education for careers in business nor adequate liberal education. Grinnell College received \$28,000 for an experiment in which traditional business subjects are being replaced with five experimental courses that portray business as a central institution of society.

At several graduate schools of business, major innovations are being

undertaken, all having as their common denominator a rejection of narrow vocationalism.

The "clinical" approach pioneered by the Harvard Business School long ago demonstrated a usefulness that has guaranteed it a firm place in business-school research and teaching. Recently, however, two newcomers to the business field, both components of engineering institutions, have embarked on imaginative research and teaching programs designed to supplement this clinical approach; they are exploring the anatomy of decision-making and organizational behavior with the tools of the social sciences, mathematics, and engineering in what they term a "scientific" approach.

At the Carnegie Graduate School of Industrial Administration, a research program, primarily focused on new methods of analyzing business decision-making, has been strengthened by a \$750,000 grant to endow a rotating research professorship and provide five years of research support.

A grant of \$275,000 was made to support a five-year research program at the School of Industrial Management of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. It is directed toward the application of electronic computer techniques to a study of the dynamic behavior of economic systems and industrial organizations. Although the approach relies on mathematical applications, it necessitates close cooperation with business firms if the mathematical models are to simulate reality.

In a different direction from this "scientific" analysis of the business process, other schools are placing emphasis on the role and effect of the business firm in contemporary civilization in what may be termed a "societal" approach. At the Columbia Graduate School of Business, a new curriculum is being designed, with \$150,000 of Foundation aid, to set effective training in business management within a broad perspective that emphasizes the role and effect of the business firm in society. An integral part of this program is the appointment on an experimental basis of a professor of philosophy for business who would point up basic and often neglected aspects of the business firm within the contemporary institutional and cultural framework.

The Foundation financed two summer seminars to acquaint teachers in a number of business schools with the "scientific" approach, on the one hand, and the "clinical" approach, on the other.

Senior faculty members of thirty-five schools of business met on the Williams College campus to attend a four-week seminar on "New Developments in Business Administration," sponsored by the Carnegie Graduate School of Industrial Administration. For the third consecutive year, an

eight-week seminar in the case method of instruction was held at the Harvard Graduate School of Business Administration and attended by professors from twenty-one business schools.

Two grants were designed to facilitate the collection of instructional materials. The Foundation granted \$120,000 to the American Association of Collegiate Schools of Business to help establish, on a three-year trial basis, an intercollegiate clearinghouse for case materials in business. A bibliography of available cases will be published and, on request, free samples of cases will be furnished to college teachers.


A grant of \$99,000 to the Cornell Graduate School of Business and Public Administration will provide support for research in new teaching materials that will be used initially in Cornell's executive program. These materials will deal with long-term planning, programing, communication, and management of financial and human resources within the firm.

# **Research on Economic Problems**


Grants totaling \$605,000 to eight universities (Duke, Harvard, Johns Hopkins, Princeton, and Yale Universities, Massachusetts Institute of Technology, and the Universities of Washington and Wisconsin) supported research on economic problems of the faculties' own choice. Research by individual faculty members was also assisted through thirty-three faculty fellowships, which provide a year's full release of time from regular academic duties plus limited allowance for research expenses. The list of faculty-fellowship recipients and of graduate students who were awarded predoctoral and doctoral-dissertation fellowships begins on page 210.


During the past summer, seminars designed to stimulate research interest and increase research competence were established on an experimental basis. They were conducted by leading economists at Northwestern University and the Universities of Minnesota and Wisconsin and were attended by professors of twenty-nine colleges. Each was supported by a grant of \$15,000. A grant of \$38,000 was made to the American Economic Association to provide a generally useful research tool through development of a cumulative index of economic journals.

Major research projects financed by the Foundation include: \$295,000 to New York University for experiments by the Inter-University Committee for Research on Consumer Behavior with survey methods to obtain more accurate data on household savings; \$92,000 for a critical examination of the history of occupational disability in California by the Institute of











Industrial Relations of the University of California (Berkeley); \$110,000 for a three-year study of regional economic maturity by Brown University faculty members; \$280,000 for an analysis of Britain's current and future economic situation by the National Institute of Economic and Social Research, in London; and \$100,000 for a study of structural changes in Swedish production and consumption by a research group that will work under the auspices of the University of Stockholm.

# **Economic Understanding**

The Foundation has a continuing interest in the development of effective means of increasing the citizen's economic comprehension. The Joint Council on Economic Education received \$600,000 for support over a five-year period of its program to increase the effectiveness of economic instruction in the nation's schools.

Each year, throughout the free world, several hundred thousand college students enroll in introductory courses in economics. Substantial improvement in the content and methods of elementary economics teaching is likely to be the principal effective means for bettering economic education of the citizen. The Foundation granted \$29,200 to support a study at Grinnell College to seek out and publicize the most promising forward steps in this area.

A grant of \$78,000 to the Committee for Economic Development provided support for an essay competition to obtain creative ideas from American and foreign economists and other interested persons on "the most important economic problem which will face the United States in the next twenty years." Publication of the best presentations should promote informed discussion of key economic problems and lead to promising research and action toward their alleviation.

# BEHAVIORAL SCIENCES

When it was decided to conclude the Behavioral Sciences program, several terminal grants were made to strengthen personnel resources, to sustain the vitality of centers of excellence, and to support efforts likely to yield and apply knowledge of the field. During its six-year history, the program, exclusive of Mental Health, accounted for 218 grants totaling nearly \$24 million to eighty-five institutions in the United States and abroad.

# **Center for Advanced Study**

Previous grants to the Center for Advanced Study in the Behavioral Sciences financed its operation through the 1958-59 academic year. A terminal grant of \$5 million, bringing total Foundation support to \$10,350,000, extends the Center for at least five more years and permits continuance beyond 1964 if it obtains funds from other sources.

The Center was established by the Foundation "to develop the general field of the behavioral sciences as fully and as richly as possible over a relatively short period of time by concentration upon the advanced study of highly creative and productive behavioral scientists of established reputation and of highly promising young scholars with their professional careers ahead of them."

It opened in 1954 at Stanford, California. By the end of 1958-59, it will have had more than 230 fellows in residence for a year. They have been selected from thirty-eight American colleges and universities, from research and other agencies interested in the behavioral sciences, and from foreign institutions.

# Individual Basic Research

Support for scientists now making substantial contributions to various behavioral fields totaled \$1,005,100. Grants ranging from \$30,000 to \$172,900 went to twelve institutions to support basic research by twenty-two members of their faculties and staffs. The scholars, who were selected by the Foundation with the assistance of special panels of advisers, are listed on page 214.

The scientists cover a wide range of fields: in psychology—thinking and cognition, personality, language, neuropsychology, development and socialization, brain mechanisms and behavior; in anthropology—linguistics, kinship, evolutionary behavior, and social organization; in sociology—comparative social structure, social theory, and problems of mass behavior; and in statistics—the application of statistical methods to problems of the behavioral sciences.

## **Grants-in-Aid and Fellowships**

The Foundation's small, unrestricted grants for research in human behavior have been productive and highly regarded by the behavioral-sciences community. The remaining thirty-seven of the 100 grants-in-aid provided by a

1955 appropriation of \$425,000 were awarded in 1957 and are listed on page 215. Fifty additional grants of this type will be made in the next five years from \$200,000 granted to the Social Science Research Council.

Two other groups of small grants were made:

Seven leading academic centers of behavioral sciences received a total of \$525,000, to which they will add \$350,000 over five years for small research grants to more than 300 scholars on their faculties. Similar grants to faculty members of other institutions will be made by the S.S.R.C., which received \$150,000 for this purpose.

To enable graduate students at various universities to complete their doctoral dissertations without interruptions caused by financial difficulties, \$250,000 was provided for the award of about 100 predoctoral fellowships by the S.S.R.C.

# Institutional and General Development

Johns Hopkins University received \$750,000 to establish a new department of social relations. Instruction now offered in other departments will be strengthened by the addition of four faculty members who will form the nucleus of what the university hopes will be a permanent department.

The S.S.R.C. was granted \$260,000 to meet miscellaneous needs and to take advantage of opportunities in the behavioral sciences in general as they arise in the next five years. The funds will be spent for conferences, committee work, fellowships, and research planning.

The Russell Sage Foundation received \$250,000 for residencies by postdoctoral scholars in social agencies and professional schools and for assistance to such schools in faculty additions, fellowships, and research planning. The clearinghouse of behavioral-sciences materials at Stanford University received \$50,000.

A grant of \$1 million went to the Population Council, Inc., to support training and research on problems of population growth that have important psychological and social implications for all societies, especially those in underdeveloped areas.

# RESEARCH IN MENTAL HEALTH

The early outline for the Foundation's general activity excluded medicine, but it did call specific attention to "the disabling effect of emotional maladjustment." Mental illness exacts a severe toll in human pain and suffering

and imposes a heavy burden on society at large. The need for treatment and cure of mental disorders has been so pressing that research has often been postponed, if not neglected.

When the Foundation appropriated \$15 million in 1955 for a program in Mental Health, emphasis was put on the need for sound knowledge on which prevention and treatment might be based and on the training of scientists who might discover and apply this knowledge. Its effort has been to stimulate and support the two broad avenues of mental-health research—one centering on the social and psychological bases of mental disturbance, the other on biological, physiological, somatic, and medical factors.

Eight grants totaling \$1,583,800 this year brought to twenty-nine the number of institutions where research programs have been supported by the Foundation.

The Foundations' Fund for Research in Psychiatry, an independent organization established by the Social Research Foundation, received \$770,000. It will make research grants for five years to psychiatry departments in about fifteen medical schools in the United States and abroad. Research potential has been little realized in these strategic centers because of strong pressures for teaching and care. Relatively small research funds, freely administered by the departments, are especially appropriate to develop a research atmosphere.

Knowledge of mental health is found in many places, and the Ford Foundation has supported some promising efforts, whether by chemists, psychiatrists, neuropathologists, or others, and whether the scene was a psychiatric hospital, a university department of behavioral or physical science, a medical school, or elsewhere. By its impetus to research and training for research, we hope the Foundation has made a permanent contribution to the fundamentals of mental-health progress.

# YOUTH DEVELOPMENT

Recently, national attention has been focused upon the important social problem of juvenile delinquency. This attention has been occasioned by the increasing number of delinquents and teen-age criminals and by the increasingly serious nature of their delinquent acts.

In seeking to deal effectively with a problem of increasing dimensions, authorities and agencies are handicapped by lack of definitive procedures for coping with juvenile delinquency and lack of agreement on the way juvenile-court, police, school, and other community functions should be defined and

related. Further handicaps to those working on the problem include these: adequately trained personnel is lacking; research and evaluation are minimal; communication and cooperation between various community and state agencies is often poor; and available facilities are frequently not used as advantageously as they could be.

So far, the Foundation's emerging Youth Development program has focused most of its attention upon the problem of juvenile delinquency. It is, however, only one aspect of the over-all objective of the program, which is the balanced development of youth—morally, intellectually, and physically—so that they will become constructive citizens in our society.

A \$129,500 grant was made to the New York School of Social Work, Inc., for a comparative study of correctional institutions for juvenile delinquents. The primary purpose of the research project is to get reliable information on the corrective effects of different methods of treatment upon the inmates of juvenile institutions.

The juvenile-delinquency studies of Sheldon and Eleanor Glueck have been in progress since 1925. For the past four years, their work has been supported primarily by a Foundation grant of \$200,000 made in 1952. The Gluecks began with a number of studies of various delinquent and criminal populations and then turned to what is now their major work—a detailed, intensive study of matched groups of 500 delinquents and 500 non-delinquents. The first findings of this study were published in 1950 in a book entitled *Unraveling Juvenile Delinquency*. To enable the Gluecks to continue their study, the Foundation made an additional grant of \$165,000 to Harvard University.

A grant of \$10,000 was made to the University of Minnesota for partial support for two ten-week Juvenile Officers' Institutes that are being held this year and in 1958. The purpose of the institutes is to help law-enforcement officers through an intensive training program in the handling of young offenders.

# PROBLEMS OF THE AGING

The Foundation's concern with problems of older persons, initially stimulated by economic implications, has been broadened by further staff study. During the year, grants totaling \$140,000 were made to the National Committee on the Aging of the National Social Welfare Assembly out of a 1956 appropriation of \$500,000. These funds are for general support of the Committee, particularly its program-evaluation and community-information

work. For research into the adjustment problems of persons who move to new communities for retirement, a grant of \$24,000 was made to the University of Florida.

The Foundation expects to continue to make grants in this important problem area on a limited, experimental basis.

## HOSPITAL AID

The Foundation's special \$200 million program of aid to hospitals was completed with second, final payments to 3,342 voluntary, nonprofit hospitals in the United States and its territories. Grants ranged from \$10,000 to \$250,000.

While the hospital program has ended, the basic conditions from which it originated remain. The needs of hospitals are still great. The costs of new buildings and of modernizing old facilities continue to rise. Hospitals still are acutely pressed for space, for new and expensive equipment, and for the services that come with new advances in medical knowledge and better standards of medical care.

Evidence accumulates, however, that communities are meeting the challenge implicit in the grants. Hospital fund appeals appear to have won a more sympathetic and generous hearing. Many citizens and groups have not waited to be asked to help. Many hospitals, sensing an awakening of community interest, have been able to introduce services and facilities once considered beyond their means.

Authorities in the hospital field believe that many hospitals could make more efficient use of their facilities and personnel by improving administrative skills. As a conclusion to its program of hospital aid, the Foundation granted \$825,000 to the Hospital Research and Education Trust for a five-year program to improve the efficiency of administrative practices of hospitals as an element of improved patient care.

In its first year, the program will undertake to develop standards for the evaluation of hospital administration; in the second, criteria will be tested and refined. In the third year, a counseling program will be offered, upon request and without charge, to any hospital listed by the American Hospital Association. The service will provide an evaluation of administrative performance and assistance in improving techniques.

By the fifth year, the program will have been reviewed and any adjustments indicated will be made. Foundation support will then cease, but the program is expected to continue thereafter under the auspices of the A.H.A.

## INTERNATIONAL ACTIVITIES

### Study of Foreign Areas and International Relations

The primary means by which the Foundation seeks to strengthen American understanding of other peoples is by helping to improve American competence in foreign and international affairs. We have helped several universities expand and improve their teaching programs in foreign-area and international studies and have granted research funds to various institutions and scholarly societies. Fellowships for foreign-area and international-relations training have been awarded to help improve teaching and provide training for persons who plan to enter public service and related fields. And grants have been made to assemble basic research data, to prepare language tools, and to support international-training programs in agricultural extension, economic research, and education.

Emphasis continues to be placed on training and research on geographic areas about which American knowledge and educational resources are meager: Asia, the Near and Middle East, Eastern Europe, the Soviet Union, and Africa. The Foundation also maintains an interest in helping universities bring about a closer tie between area studies and international relations.

Three actions this year contributed to a better understanding by the West of the Near and Middle East and of Islamic culture in general:

The Center for Middle Eastern Studies at Harvard University received a five-year grant of \$300,000 for graduate assistance and for instruction and research in social science. Funds for individual scholars working on the Near and Middle East will be provided by a grant of \$150,000 to the Social Science Research Council to enable its Near and Middle East Committee to conduct a three-year grant-in-aid program. Study of the culture of the Islamic world, which embraces some four hundred million people in countries from North Africa through the Middle East to Pakistan, India, and Indonesia, was assisted by a five-year grant of \$250,000 to McGill University, Canada, for new faculty for its Institute of Islamic Studies.

A serious problem in Near and Middle Eastern and Asian training programs is the long period of time required to master Oriental languages, often at the expense of important subject-matter studies. Aided by a \$176,500 grant, the five major centers of Near Eastern studies in the United States (Columbia, Harvard, Johns Hopkins, Michigan, and Princeton) plan to cooperate over a five-year period in developing new teaching materials and methods and conducting an intensive eight-week summer teaching program in Arabic, Turkish, and Persian. The Modern Language Association of America received \$45,000 for a two-year project of testing,

analysis, and evaluation to improve the teaching of Chinese and other non-West European languages.

To advance work in the comparative and international problems of education, a five-year grant of \$350,000 was made to the University of Chicago for training American and foreign nationals to help solve the educational problems of underdeveloped countries and for efforts to achieve a better understanding of education's role in foreign societies.

Applied research on the social and economic development of India, a matter of paramount importance when it is related to the contrasting ideologies and methods of Communist China, was supported by a four-year grant of \$450,000 to the Center for International Studies at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. The Center will send a team of social scientists to India to cooperate with four Indian research organizations in analysis and research on social and economic problems.

These two grants illustrate the importance the Foundation attaches to the social sciences in the solution of foreign and international problems. To enhance the contribution of these and related fields, \$200,000 was granted to the Center of International Studies at Princeton University.

The University of Washington received \$350,000 to help finance, over a five-year period, research on Northeast Asia and on the relations among the countries of this area and with the United States.

Fundamental to American scholarship and the progress of research in the United States on Eastern countries is closer association of American specialists with scholars and scientists of Eastern nations. The preoccupation of men of attainment with heavy teaching, research, or governmental duties in their own countries inhibits this association. To broaden this important channel of communication, the Foundation provided \$800,000 to the University of Chicago to enable Columbia and Harvard Universities and the Universities of Chicago and California (Berkeley) to invite, over a five-year period, up to forty distinguished scholars from countries of Asia and the Near East to the United States to carry on their research in association with American scholars.

The Foundation provided \$350,000 to the University of California (Berkeley) to support a program of advanced training and research on modern China.

Support of teaching, research, and information on Africa was provided by grants totaling \$217,500 made to Boston and Howard Universities and the International African Institute, London. Study of the Soviet Union and Eastern Europe was aided through a grant of \$200,500 to the Social Science Research Council; the funds will be used by the Council's Joint Committee

on Slavic Studies to assist research on the Soviet Union and Eastern Europe and to make an analytical review of current American teaching and scholarship in these areas.

### **Exchange of Persons and Information**

Another aspect of the Foundation's interest in helping to promote understanding between America and other countries is assistance to organizations that either educate and inform the American public on international affairs or that arrange international visits, conferences, and seminars for students, leaders, and professional people:

Among the activities in public education the Foundation has supported is an experimental program conducted by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. For the past two years, the N.C.A. has been preparing and introducing instructional materials in foreign affairs for high-school use. The past success and future promise of the program prompted the Foundation to provide \$250,000 for an additional two years.

Through an \$85,000 grant to Columbia University, the Foundation aided the Eleventh American Assembly, which considered United States foreign aid. Periodically, the Assembly conducts forums at which leading citizens study and discuss a major national or international issue.

The Foundation continued this year to support a number of seminars and conferences that enable Americans and foreign nationals to exchange information and opinion on important international problems. It financed the attendance of Americans and Africans at the Eighth International Seminar of the Canadian World University Service in Ghana. A grant of \$66,000 will enable the International Press Institute to conduct a two-year program of exchange of journalists between the United States and the British Commonwealth.

### **Fellowships**

In addition to fellowship assistance under grants to advance international training and research, the Foundation administers two formal programs of fellowships for this purpose.

One is a program of Foreign Area Training Fellowships. These are open on a competitive basis to college seniors about to enter graduate school, to graduate students, and to persons of demonstrated ability in professions for training related to Asia, the Near East, the Soviet Union, Eastern Europe, and Africa.

The second is a program of International Relations Training Fellowships. These are open to college and university faculty members for further training in international relations, other social sciences, and the humanities, or for study of one of the foreign areas mentioned above.

Thus far, nearly 900 fellowship grants or extensions of grants have been made under these two programs. For the 1957-58 academic year, 171 Foreign Area Training Fellowships and eleven International Relations Training Fellowships were granted. The list of recipients begins on page 199.

# INTERNATIONAL LEGAL STUDIES

The aims of the Foundation's program in International Legal Studies are, one, to increase American competence in the legal aspects of international and foreign affairs and, two, to deepen and broaden the understanding of the legal profession so that it may contribute to the improved conduct of international relations.

Grants this year of \$334,000 to the University of Pennsylvania and \$200,000 to Northwestern University bring to fourteen the number of law schools that, since 1954, have received assistance for the expansion of their international legal studies programs. These funds are being used for new courses and materials, for faculty development and teacher training, for fellowships for foreign lawyers, and for research.

Cooperative projects of training and research between American and foreign law schools were supported under various Foundation grants. Five American law schools have undertaken such projects with nine foreign institutions. A grant of \$68,000 was made this year to Columbia University to help finance a cooperative arrangement between its law school and those of the Universities of Michigan and Istanbul. An appropriation of \$575,000 was made to finance over a six-year period a cooperative program of legal research and training on Indian legal problems. It will be conducted by the Indian Law Institute in association with American and other non-Indian law schools and lawyers.

# **EUROPEAN PROGRAM**

A significant decision was made this year to expand our activities relating to Europe. The enlarged program includes assistance to organizations, institutions, and individuals, principally in Europe, to encourage progress toward three long-range objectives: strengthening of democratic institutions, improving mutual understanding and cooperation in the European-Atlantic

community, and encouraging the development of relations on a democratic basis between East Europe and the West.

Within these aims—and in response to the humanitarian call felt by the free world—the Foundation early this year appropriated \$1,150,000 to aid Hungarian refugee scholars, students, artists, and other intellectuals.

From these funds, grants totaling \$837,600 were made to educational institutions and organizations in eight European countries to provide two-year scholarships for more than 500 Hungarian refugee students.

To help those who came to the United States, \$122,059 was granted to the Institute of International Education for partial support of intensive language and orientation programs at Bard College, in New York; St. Michael's College, Winooski, Vermont; and a number of other institutions.

The occupational resettlement of Hungarian artists, writers, scientists, teachers, and professors was both vital and difficult. To help provide new hope and opportunities for these men and women living in Austria and elsewhere, primarily in Europe, grants totaling \$95,000 were made to the Congress for Cultural Freedom, Paris.

Another event in Europe bearing on the aims of the Foundation's program—particularly that of furthering democratic relations between East Europe and the West—was the change in Poland that opened new opportunities to strengthen free contact. The Foundation appropriated \$500,000 for an exchange of professors, students, and professional specialists between Poland and the United States and Western Europe.

This appropriation enables a selected number of outstanding Polish scholars and advanced students in the social sciences, engineering, and architecture to study and travel in the United States and Western Europe, and it permits a small number of similar persons from the United States and Western Europe to visit Poland. It also provides funds to distribute American and Western European books, periodicals, and equipment to Polish libraries and educational institutions.

To date, grants totaling \$321,000 have been made to a selected group of organizations in the United States, Western Europe, and Poland. The Institute of International Education received \$200,000 for an exchange of persons between the United States and Poland; the British Council, \$25,000 for an exchange between the United Kingdom and Poland; and the National Office of French Universities and Schools, \$16,000 for an exchange between France and Poland. The University of Poznan, in Poland, received \$80,000 for books, periodicals, and equipment for eight Polish universities.

The improvement of understanding between the United States and Finland was the objective of a grant of \$140,000 to the American-

Scandinavian Foundation for its program of exchange with Finland. Over the next four years, fifty Finnish leaders, selected largely from the press, radio, the clergy, trade unions, and the arts, will make two-month visits to the United States. Six American leaders each year will extend their private European itineraries to include about ten days in Finland.

The Foundation contributes to the growth of understanding in the European-Atlantic community and between the East and West by assisting European educational and cultural organizations devoted to the advancement of democratic ideals and to the economic development of Europe.

One of these organizations is the Congress for Cultural Freedom, Paris, upon which the Foundation relied for support to Hungarian refugee intellectuals. Through periodicals published in four languages, a program of international seminars and conferences, and sixteen international committees in Europe, Asia, and Latin America, the Congress encourages free communication and discussion among non-Communist scholars, artists, and other intellectuals. The Foundation granted \$500,000 this year to help the Congress expand three phases of its program: study groups, seminars, and conferences; research projects on important current issues; and activities on behalf of East Europe.

A program of adult education conducted by two sister organizations, the European Cultural Foundation and the European Cultural Center, Geneva, was assisted by a \$40,000 grant to the Center. Continued help to another organization that seeks to strengthen cultural ties among European peoples was provided by a grant of \$150,000 to the European Center for International Exchange, Brussels, for its program of educational activities and exchanges.

Two other European education organizations, the Austrian College, in Vienna, and the Hansard Society for Parliamentary Government, in London, were supported. A three-year grant of \$90,000 went to the Austrian College for its annual "European Forum" at Alpbach and its educational activities on current problems. The Hansard Society received \$70,000 for assistance over a five-year period for its international program of research, publication, conferences, and lectures aimed at strengthening understanding of representative government.

Assistance to activities devoted specifically to European economic development included the following:

A grant of \$520,000 went to the Association for the Industrial Development of Southern Italy—an organization known as SVIMEZ that conducts research on economic development. The grant gives five-year support for a new center to train economists in problems of economic development.

The European Productivity Agency, Paris, received \$98,400 to finance temporary appointments of American professors of business administration at European universities and institutes. The University of Lausanne, Switzerland, received \$25,000 for research relating to practical problems of European integration.

# **OVERSEAS DEVELOPMENT**

In many of the world's underdeveloped areas, the Foundation is helping people to improve their educational systems and standards of living by means of relatively small but significant assistance to their own programs of social and economic development. Since 1950, it has appropriated some \$75 million to help thirteen nations of the world to help themselves.

Expert consultants have been made available to these governments to assist them in identifying and solving their problems. Aid has been given to establish new, or to strengthen existing, educational and training institutions, including centers for the training of village extension workers, technical, agricultural, and teacher-training institutes, secondary schools, and universities.

In the coming year, the Foundation will consider extending its program to Africa, Latin America, and Asian countries where it is not now operating. A Foundation team has visited eight countries of Africa, and additional exploratory studies will be made on that continent. Funds will continue to be allotted in the countries encompassed by the present program. Grants during 1957 totaled \$12,808,189.

### India

The cornerstone of India's Second Five-Year Plan is a major expansion of heavy industry, including a 250-per-cent increase in steel production. Private steel companies in India have undertaken large construction and training programs, and the government is building three new mills. Young engineers are being sent abroad to be trained to operate the mills. American assistance represents a cooperative effort by the American steel industry, organized steel workers, higher education, and philanthropy.

Under the auspices of the American Iron and Steel Institute, seven American steel companies are providing facilities and funds for a year's in-plant instruction for 200 Indian engineers. Five engineering schools located near the cooperating mills are providing classroom instruction, living quarters, and personal guidance. Through a grant of \$1.5 million,

the Foundation is financing this phase of the program, which is under the general supervision of the Carnegie Institute of Technology.

India's industrial advancement also was aided this year by a five-year grant of \$500,000 to the National Council of Applied Economic Research, which conducts research for government agencies and private industry on problems in economics and management.

An important social aspect of industrial expansion in India is the inevitable additional congestion in its cities. The Foundation provided \$280,200 to enable a team of urban-affairs experts to help carry through a planning project for the capital region of Delhi, which it is hoped will serve as an example in other municipal areas.

The Foundation continued its assistance to India's programs for educational advancement and for the reconstruction of rural village life, both of which are major elements in the development of the nation.

A grant of \$418,000 supports for a four-year period the activities of the All-India Council for Secondary Education, India's principal instrument for reform in secondary education. And a three-year grant of \$357,000 was made for establishing departments of extension services in India's teacher-training colleges for secondary-school instructors.

Many high schools teach in Hindi or the regional languages, whereas university study calls for facility in English. India has established an English Language Teaching Institute to train teachers and to develop appropriate methods and materials for instruction. A grant of \$685,000 will help this project.

Aid to rural development focused largely on health education and research. Additional two-year support of \$258,000 was given for a research-and-action project in environmental sanitation. It is apparent, however, that social and cultural factors are intricately related to methods of health education and that such factors are often more difficult than the technical problems of health. A five-year grant of \$291,000 will enable the Indian Council of Medical Research to promote a closer relationship between the social sciences and health education.

### **Pakistan**

In Pakistan, as in other countries, the Foundation has helped the government establish new types of institutions to carry forward long-term programs of social and economic development.

Last year the Foundation helped finance the planning of academies (one each in East and West Pakistan) to train supervisors and adminis-

trators of village development. This year \$1,017,000 was granted to enable the government to obtain from Michigan State University the staff training and advisory services necessary to begin operating the academies.

Through an arrangement with Harvard University, the Foundation helped Pakistan prepare its First Five-Year Plan and organize a Central Planning Board, both of which became operative in April. A three-year additional grant of \$1.1 million will help strengthen the central and provincial planning agencies by providing for continued advisory, research, and training services.

Technical education has been aided by grants for polytechnic institutes at Karachi and Dacca. A third such institute at Rawalpindi is being supported by a grant of \$450,000. Oklahoma State University of Agriculture and Applied Science is assisting in the development of these institutes.

### Nepal

In Nepal, the Foundation has helped establish a home-economics training institute and a village- and small-industries training institute. Both institutes, located in Kathmandu, are now operating successfully. Two grants totaling \$468,650 this year will strengthen the latter and help establish four provincial branches.

### Indonesia

Continuing its support to Indonesia's teacher-training colleges, the Foundation granted \$260,640 to enable seventeen prospective faculty members to attend American universities. This brings the total now studying in the United States to twenty-two.

Technical education has been aided primarily through the William Hood Dunwoody Industrial Institute, of Minneapolis, which has provided instructor-advisers to Indonesia's first Technical Teacher Training Institute in Bandung and has trained Indonesians in Minneapolis. A grant of \$162,790 to the Institute at Bandung, now entirely staffed by Indonesians, continues the Dunwoody services and provides other assistance.

Aid to higher education includes support for strengthening instruction and research in economics. Gadjah Mada State University received \$550,000, and Nommensen University, a private institution, \$282,000 to provide graduate training in the United States for future faculty members and to obtain visiting American professors.

Indonesia's new program in community development received \$60,000

for equipment and materials for its first Community Development Training Center and \$62,000 to enable the teaching staff to study rural development and extension methods at the University of Kentucky.

### Burma

In response to the recent decision of the government of Burma to expand agricultural education in its high and middle schools, \$44,000 was granted to provide training equipment for six schools that will serve as models.

Another contribution to education was a grant of \$600,000 to the Burma Translation Society, which translates and distributes foreign publications and prepares and produces books for educational use and general circulation. Its program also deals with materials for those who have recently learned to read or whose reading skill is limited. The grant provides funds for technical advisers, equipment, and staff training.

To introduce training for public administration, the government has established an Institute of Public Administration and Management, and the Foundation provided \$92,000 to help set up the Institute's library.

### **Near East**

Eight countries of the Near East—Egypt, Iran, Iraq, Israel, Jordan, Lebanon, Syria, and Turkey—have received Foundation assistance, mainly for projects in education and rural development.

Aid has been given also to institutions and organizations that serve the whole Near East region. Important among these is the American University of Beirut, a major Near Eastern cultural, educational, and research center, which received an additional \$1.5 million for general support over a two-year period.

In Iran, encouraging progress is being made in two related areas: the formation of agricultural cooperatives and the establishment of a system of rural credit. In Iraq, \$400,000 was granted to the Iraq-American Education Association for buildings at the new Al-Hikma University of Baghdad.

Through grants to the Israel Foundation, assistance has been given for applied research on the country's productive capacity. In Jordan, the Foundation has contributed to the work of the Arab Development Society, which operates an experimental farm and vocational school for refugee orphan boys in the Jordan Valley.

In 1956, funds were granted to Jordan, Lebanon, and Syria to help

expand rural teacher training. Syria received \$59,500 this year for two-year training at the University of Georgia of six future faculty members of a new rural teachers college.

In Turkey, provision was made for continued advisory services at experimental high schools to improve Turkey's system of secondary education. Other assistance has made possible the training of teachers and administrators in the United States.

## MISCELLANEOUS GRANTS

This year, as in the past, the Foundation, in recognition of its over-all civic responsibility, made several grants for purposes that do not fall within the scope of its ongoing programs. In addition, a few grants were made to support projects in the State of Michigan, where most of the Foundation's activities were concentrated in its early years. The expenditure for these out-of-program grants amounted to \$1,605,000.

The Foundation Library Center received \$300,000 for four-year support to expand its activities as a service center for information about foundations and to encourage fuller public reporting of foundation activities.

Other grants were: \$475,000 to the National Trust for Historic Preservation in the United States and \$25,000 to the Edison Institute for rebuilding and restoring the Wayside Inn, South Sudbury, Massachusetts; \$200,000 to the Russell Sage Foundation for research studies on philanthropy and \$100,000 to the University of Wisconsin for studies in the history of American philanthropy; \$10,000 to Wayne State University for the establishment of a Retail Memorial Library and for the implementation of a Retailing Management Program; \$2,500 to Radcliffe College for its business program for graduate students; \$7,500 to Grosse Pointe University School for the James B. Webber, Jr., Memorial Scholarship Fund and other purposes; \$300,000 to the United Foundation, of Detroit, \$150,000 to the Canadian Social Science Research Council, \$30,000 to the Detroit Symphony Orchestra, and \$5,000 to Trinity College for general support of their respective programs.

# **Financial Statements**

# THE TREASURER'S REPORT

It is the policy of the Foundation to make available a full review of its financial affairs in the Annual Report. The regular exhibits show detailed information concerning income, expenses, grants, and appropriations for the fiscal year ended September 30, 1957 and a summary of the Foundation's financial position at that date. The following sections are designed to provide a further explanation of financial operations in the year.

#### Income

Income in 1957 totaled \$102,908,434. This included dividends of \$86,717,374 on the Foundation's holding of 36,132,239 shares of Ford Motor Company Class A stock, which was unchanged during the year. Four dividends at the regular quarterly rate of sixty cents per share were received.

In comparison, total income for 1956 amounted to \$165,888,263. The reduction of income in 1957 is partially attributable to large distributions of funds in payment of grants, resulting in a sizable decline of earning investment assets. Moreover, income of the previous year reflected Ford Motor Company dividends of \$150,020,328, including extra dividends on former holdings of old Class A stock of the Ford Motor Company that were exchanged for new stock in January, 1956, in accordance with the plan of reclassification referred to in the 1956 Annual Report.

The Foundation's return from bond investments increased moderately in 1957, reflecting the general rise in interest rates. This was partially offset by a change in amortization policy eliminating accruals of bond discount income except on investments of very short maturity.

### **Grants and Appropriations**

New grant and appropriation commitments by the Board of Trustees were \$83,029,117 in the year, comparing with \$602,109,511 in 1956, which included commitments for the College, Medical School, and Hospital programs in the amount of \$500,000,000.

Under the Foundation's method of accounting, grants are treated as a deduction from income only in the fiscal year in which they are approved. Appropriations do not become a charge against income until converted into actual grants. Total grants approved in 1957, including those out of the appropriations of prior years, were \$153,393,616, compared with \$557,778,481 for the previous year. The reserve for appropriations for future grants and projects decreased \$73,011,192 during the past twelve months.

Payments to grantees in the period were \$345,200,897 as compared with \$292,029,222 in 1956, making a total of \$637,230,119 for the two years. At September 30, 1957, the balance of unpaid grants and reserve for appropriations stood at \$198,574,953, all of which is covered by an equivalent amount of short-term bond investments to insure payment of these commitments on schedule. Following is a summary of grants and appropriations for the year:

### **Fund Balances**

Grant approvals, administrative and program expenses, and project expenditures totaled \$159,629,243 in 1957, exceeding income for the year by \$56,720,809. This compares with an income deficiency of \$397,576,503 in 1956. Allowing for the Income Fund balance of \$125,072,623 at the

beginning of 1956, total grants and expenses in the two fiscal years of 1956 and 1957 have amounted to \$329,224,689 more than income earned since the inception of the Foundation. The sale of Ford Motor Company stock in 1956, details of which were given in last year's Annual Report, made possible the use of principal in furtherance of Foundation programs.

The balance of the Principal Fund was \$934,346,365 at the year-end, based on the book or carrying value of assets. However, after deducting the accumulated Income Fund deficiency and reserve for appropriations, the combined fund balances were \$549,397,635 as shown in the accompanying financial statement. This may be thought of as the "net worth" of the Foundation according to the books of account.

It may be noted that the net worth of the Foundation could be appraised at a much higher amount if holdings of Class A stock of the Ford Motor Company, carried on the Foundation books at \$9 per share or a total of \$325,190,151, were valued at a price equivalent to the common stock of the Company into which the Class A stock is convertible or exchangeable under certain conditions. There is no quoted market for the Class A stock. The common stock of the Ford Motor Company closed on September 30, 1957 at \$50.375 per share on the New York Stock Exchange. At this price, the Foundation's holding of Class A stock would have an assumed market valuation of \$1,820,161,539.

### Investments

As in the previous year, new investments authorized by the Finance Committee in 1957 were restricted to fixed-income securities. The total bond portfolio was reduced by \$242,976,000 face amount, due primarily to the use of proceeds from maturing securities for the payment of grants in excess of cash income received in the year. At September 30, 1957, maturities of investments in U. S. Government securities and other bonds and notes were as follows:

The market value of the Foundation's bond holdings declined during 1957 in line with the general downtrend in bond prices, which reflected tight money and a continuing large supply of new issues placed upon the market.

In order to take advantage of market conditions, the Finance Committee authorized a moderate program involving the sale of long-term government bonds and reinvestment in corporate securities at higher yields. Although net capital losses of \$1,202,381 were taken on these and other bond transactions, the result will be to increase the income of the Foundation over a period of time.

The Finance Committee has continued to emphasize the policy of investing primarily in securities having a ready market. Government issues still form a sizable part of the bond portfolio, but further additions to holdings of diversified corporate securities were made during the year.

Real-estate transactions in the year included sale of remaining Foundation property in California and certain undeveloped land in Michigan. The excess of sale proceeds over carrying value amounted to \$64,629 on these sales. There were no other material changes in miscellaneous investment asset holdings.

The financial statements of the Foundation for the year ended September 30, 1957 are presented in the pages which follow, together with the opinion of Price Waterhouse & Co., independent public accountants.
